## From the Headmaster's Study

For Years 7, 8, and 9, these reports will be based on Age-Related Expectations, helping you understand both academic progress and attitude to learning. For Years 10 and 11, reports will show the Most Likely Grade alongside the Target Grade, providing a clear picture of where pupils are heading and what support they may need.

“Working with younger pupils makes me realise how much a little support can mean. I would’ve loved someone to help me like this when I was younger.”


These reflections show how deeply our students engage with Catholic Social Teaching, especially through acts of kindness, solidarity, and service.

# Academic Matters

## Academic Assemblies

This week, all year groups were treated to an academic assembly where Mr Rooney shared how active learning and ratio of response links into the St Joseph's Way and also how these benefit the children's learning!

### Active Learning

We shared how active learning (where pupils are engaged in the learning, problem-solving, discussing, sharing ideas in pairs, voting and using mini-whiteboards to show their understanding) is much more effective than passive learning (where pupils receive information without interaction).

We discussed how active learning is more challenging than passive learning but ultimately benefits them more as it makes them more effective learners and increases their enjoyment and engagement in the learning!

### Ratio of Response

This refers to the proportion of pupils actively responding in a lesson. Gone are the days of a solely 'hands-up' approach to answering questions in a classroom – this only gives the teacher information about one pupils' understanding!

What we do in lessons now is employ a range of strategies to gauge the understanding of the whole class – these can include; the use of mini-whiteboards, voting on multiple-choice questions, paired discussion, responding to True or False statements as a class).

By employing these strategies, pupils can demonstrate what they have learnt which gives the teacher valuable information to aid future planning and learning!

## Assessment & Reporting – Yr 9 & 10

Next Thursday P5 at the beginning of the enrichment lesson, we will be launching the Year 10 Duke of Edinburgh Programme. It is a brilliant scheme that helps the children's personal development, gives them experiences of volunteering, developing physical and sporting skills and also the opportunity to go on an overnight expedition.

Following the launch with the pupils, we will also host a parent and pupil information evening on Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> December at 5:30pm. This will be the ideal opportunity for you, as parents, to find out more and ask any questions that you may have!

## Yr 10 Duke of Edinburgh

It was lovely to welcome many Year 8 families to school on Thursday evening. There was a lovely buzz in the hall and the canteen as we discussed progress, attainment and attitude to learning. We've always stressed the importance of teamwork and this is one of the most important aspects of the team we form. Thank you for your support and attendance!



## Academic Matters

### Assessment & Reporting – Yr 10 & 11

Towards the end of term, Year 9&10 will receive their first school reports of the academic year. These will include information on their progress and attitude to learning across all of their subjects.

For Year 9, there will also be information on their performance against Age Related expectations (i.e. is your child working above, on, or below age related expectations – this mirrors the language and approaches that you are familiar with from primary school).

For Year 10 pupils, there will also be information on their Most Likely Grades – in essence these are predicted grades based on their current work and attitude to learning.

The reports will be released prior to the Christmas break.

### Year 11 Updates

This Thursday, Year 11 had their mock exam assembly. At the assembly we distributed statements of entry for the pupils to check through. These documents include dates and times of their mock exams for January and also any tiers of entry (if applicable). This will help the pupils begin their preparations and check all details for their entries. Once all details are confirmed exam timetables will be published and ready for distribution on the Year 11 parents evening.

We also discussed the 3 most important aspects of revision:

- **Creating revision resources** (flashcards, mindmaps, lists, visuals) – we emphasised that the resources they make now will also be used for the final GCSE exams in the summer!
- **Recalling the information** – testing themselves using their resources – can they recall the information? Can they ask family / friends to test them on the key information?
- **Applying the information** – answering past questions in timed conditions. This will help train the pupils to cope in timed and exam conditions.


### New Screens

# Safeguarding Update: The Impact of Parental Conflict on Children

We want to remind everyone that children are deeply affected by the environment at home. Research shows that frequent or intense parental conflict, whether arguments, shouting, or silent tension, can have a significant impact on a child's emotional wellbeing and development.

## Children exposed to ongoing conflict may experience:

- Increased anxiety or stress
- Difficulties with concentration and learning
- Challenges in forming healthy relationships
- Lower self-esteem

It's important to remember that disagreements are normal, but how they are managed matters. Constructive communication and resolving issues calmly can help children feel secure and supported.
