Outreach and Collaboration

Spiritual Development

On 13 October, the Gideons will visit during morning assembly to gift free Bibles to our Year 7 pupils. This will be a meaningful moment in the faith journey of our new cohort, especially as they have recently been learning about Scripture in their RE lessons.

We are also delighted to share that we are now registered for the Oscar Romero Award, recognising schools that live out Catholic Social Teaching through prayer, outreach, and action. This award will help guide our charitable work and provide new opportunities for pupils to put their faith into action.

Charity and Community

Our charitable projects remain at the heart of chaplaincy life. This term we are:

- Launching the Christmas Shoebox Appeal.
- Holding a special Family Fast Day assembly, focusing on CAFOD's work.

Feast of the Guardian Angels

Yesterday we celebrated the Feast of the Guardian Angels (2 October), a special reminder of God's tender care for each one of us. Although the doctrine that every person has a guardian angel has never been defined as an article of faith, it has long been the mind of the Church, affirmed by saints such as St Jerome and St Basil, and rooted in Scripture.

Jesus Himself says:

"See that you never despise any of these little ones, for I tell you that their angels in heaven always gaze on the face of my Father in heaven." (Matthew 18:10)

This beautiful feast encourages us to remember that even children are entrusted to the watchful care of angels who remain always in God's presence while carrying out their mission on earth. The Church first began to celebrate this feast in Valencia in 1411, and by 1608 it was raised to the universal calendar.

In moments of worry, temptation, or discouragement, it can be easy to feel small or insignificant. The Feast of the Guardian Angels reminds us that we are never forgotten or alone. Each of us has an angel of our own, faithfully watching over us and guiding us towards God. We are invited not only to be grateful for their protection, but also to pray for the grace to live in such a way that we might be a joy to them, rather than a burden.

A Word from Scripture

As we continue our chaplaincy work, we draw strength from the words of St Paul in Galatians 6:9–10:

"Let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up. So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of faith."

This is the spirit we hope to instil in all our pupils — to persevere in kindness, service, and prayer, trusting that even the smallest act of generosity builds God's kingdom among us.

Teaching Resources and Equipment

As you will be aware from last week's update, we informed the children of the investments we are making in the school and their education – we shared that we spend £10k each year on Sparx and that we are surveying our IT facilities in classrooms too. This week we have conducted a survey of our classrooms and the AV equipment – we will be asking our governors to green light some further investment in order to ensure we have a first class learning experience and environment for the children!

We've also invested in equipment packs for the classrooms to ensure learning can be pacey and uninterrupted if pupils' own equipment is not working. This is a considerable expense to the school and all done with the children's best interests at heart. Please do reinforce this message with your children – if they borrow from the packs, they are expected to return the equipment!

Home Learning & Homework Club

Sparx is our main vehicle for core subject home learning. Each week, on a Wednesday, pupils in all year groups will be set Sparx Reader, Sparx Maths and Sparx Science tasks for their home learning – these will be due in on the following Tuesday. All other subjects will set home learning in accordance to the subjects' needs – that may be consolidation of learning, research for upcoming learning or applying information in exam style questions or even extended projects. All of these tasks will be set via Class Charts.

We will be awarded merits for completion of home learning to an excellent standard which will build up pupils' currency for the reward store and enable them to buy rewards and use them towards rewards trips. We will also be giving demerits if home learning is not completed to the expected standard and this will take away the rewards points and thus the ability to buy

rewards. It really is important to engage well with the home learning that is set – not only will it help your child's progress, it will also impact on their rewards!

Tuesday's after school will be our Homework club – this will be from 3:30-4:30 in a computer room and enable pupils to meet the weekly Sparx deadlines if they have technical issues at home.

We have reviewed many aspects of the curriculum and have updated the aforementioned documents accordingly. We are adding new key term lists and personal learning checklists for each subject area on our website. These are excellent resources for the children to engage with for reinforcing key vocabulary and also checking their learning across the term.



Pastoral Support

Safeguarding Update: Offensive Weapons in School – Risks and Consequences

We are committed to maintaining a safe and nurturing environment for all students. As part of our safeguarding responsibilities, we want to raise awareness about the serious risks and consequences associated with bringing offensive weapons into school.

What is an Offensive Weapon?

An offensive weapon is defined as any item made, adapted, or intended to cause injury. This includes knives, blades, sharp tools, and other objects that could be used to harm others.

Why This Matters

Bringing a weapon into school - even if not used, can have devastating consequences:

- Immediate police involvement: Possession of a weapon on school grounds is a criminal offence under UK law.
- Permanent exclusion: Schools are required to take firm action, which may include suspension or permanent exclusion.
- Criminal record: Young people may face prosecution, affecting future education, employment, and travel opportunities.
- Emotional and social impact: The presence of weapons can cause fear, trauma, and breakdown of trust within the school community.

What Parents Can Do

- Talk to your child: Discuss the dangers and legal consequences of carrying weapons.
- Monitor belongings: Be aware of what your child brings to school.
- Encourage openness: Create a safe space for your child to share concerns or peer pressure they may be facing.
- Report concerns: If you suspect a child may be carrying a weapon, please contact the school or local safeguarding team immediately.

 - **To the Police:** Dial **101** to speak to Wiltshire Police or visit their website to report information or request help.

Support Available

If a child is found in possession of a weapon, schools may work with multi-agency teams to assess the situation and offer diversionary interventions where appropriate. What Parents & Carers Need to Know about DISCORD

AGE RATING
13+

Servers and channels marked as 'NSFW' require users to be 18 or older to join.

Discord is a free app which allows users to communicate in real time via text, video or voice chat. Available on desktop and mobile devices, it was originally designed to help gamers cooperate – but has evolved into a more general networking platform for a range of online communities, discussing topics like TV series, music, Web3 and more. Discord is organised around closed groups, referred to as 'servers'. To join a server, users must be invited or provided with a unique link. It's a space for users to interact with friends, meet others with shared interests and collaborate privately online – but it's also a place where young people can be exposed to risks if the right precautions aren't taken.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

CYBERBULLYING

Discord's easy accessibility and connectivity, unfortunately, makes it an ideal place for cyberbullying to occur – especially as audio and video streams disappear once they've ended, meaning that bullying could take place without leaving any evidence. Closed groups can also be created, giving young people the opportunity to exclude their peers or send cruel messages without adult oversight.

DIFFICULT TO MODERATE

Like many private communication apps, Discord's real-time messaging can be difficult to control. The system enables content moderation through each individual server – so different groups can set their own rules for what's acceptable, and some groups may not monitor for unsuitable content. Anything that happens in an audio or video stream is also virtually untraceable once the stream has concluded.

INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Discord mainly hosts private groups, making it easier for unsuitable or explicit content to be shared on channels. Pornography, racism and inappropriate language can be found in some groups. Server owners are required to add an age-restriction gate to channels where 18+ content is being shared – but this solution isn't foolproof, as the platform doesn't always verify users' ages when they sign up.

ACCESSIBLE TO PREDATORS

On many chat platforms, users can lie about their age or true identity – and Discord is no exception. Predators have attempted to abuse the platform by using it to contact and communicate with underage users – by initially chatting with a child on an age-appropriate channel, for example. While Discord has improved its safety settings, some users will still try to bypass them for malicious reasons.

CRIMINAL ACTIVITY

Discord does have strict Terms of Service and Community Guidelines to protect its users – but, sadly, not everyone adheres to them. Criminal activity including grooming, hate speech, harassment, exploitative content, doxxing and extremist or violent material have all been found on Discord servers over the last two years. In 2020, Discord received almost 27,000 reports of illegal activity on the platform.

Advice for Parents & Carers

REVIEW SAFETY SETTINGS

Discord has a series of safety settings, enabling users to choose who can direct message them or send them friend requests. Your child's experience on Discord will be much safer if the app's privacy and safety settings are configured to only allow messages or friend requests from server members. This will minimise the chances of potential predators from outside the group contacting them.

EXPLAIN AGE FILTERING

While Discord requires users to be at least 13 to sign up, many servers geared towards older users are flagged as NSFW (not safe for work), which indicates they probably contain material that's inappropriate for children. It can be easy to click through settings without properly reviewing them, so ensure your child understands why age filtering is important and that it's there to protect them.

SCREEN OUT EXPLICIT CONTENT

In the privacy and safety settings, Discord users are offered the ability to filter direct messages for inappropriate content – a setting that should be enabled if your child uses the platform. Discord automatically tries to flag images that are explicit, but the setting must be manually enabled for text. If a young user is sent explicit content in a direct message, Discord will scan and (if necessary) delete it.

MONITOR ONLINE ACTIVITY

It's wise to regularly review your child's activity on Discord. This can include checking their safety settings to ensure they're correctly enabled, talking about which servers they've joined and reviewing some of their friends and direct messages. Ask if anything has made them feel uncomfortable or unsafe. Things can change quickly online, so plan routine check-ins and follow up frequently.

DISCUSS GOOD ONLINE BEHAVIOUR

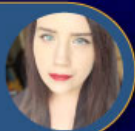
The anonymity offered by the internet often leads people to communicate more openly online and behave differently than they would at school or home. It's crucial to bear in mind, though, that every internet user is still a real person. Talk to your child about the severe and lasting consequences that cyberbullying or exchanging inappropriate material online can have in the real world.

HAVE CANDID CONVERSATIONS

It can sometimes be awkward to discuss topics like grooming, pornography, racism or explicit content with your child – but it's important to ensure they're aware of the harms these things can pose. Talking openly about these subjects is a great way to help your child feel more comfortable about coming to you if they experience an unwanted encounter on Discord (or anywhere else online).

UNIFORM



Saint Joseph's
CATHOLIC SCHOOL

The school believes that a high standard of appearance and presentation enhances the dignity of the individual and raises self-esteem. To that end, school uniform should be worn properly to and from school and throughout the school day.

FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH SCHOOL EXPECTATIONS ON UNIFORM CAN RESULT IN SANCTION. MORE INFORMATION CAN BE FOUND ON THE SCHOOL WEBSITE.

UNIFORM EXPECTATIONS

TROUSERS - Black or dark grey. Tailored. No jeans, leggings, corduroys, or casual trousers. May be supported by a dark, narrow, unbranded belt.

SKIRTS - Black. Must be pleated. No tube skirts. Knee high.

SHORTS - Black. Smart, tailored (no cargo or sports shorts).

SHIRT - Plain white. Full button and collar.

BLAZER - Blue blazer with school logo.

TIE - House Tie - Red, Blue, Green or Yellow.

SOCKS/TIGHTS - Socks, short (ankle/trainer). Black, navy blue, or white. Or plain natural/black tights.

SHOES - Black. Shoes must be completely black (including the soles) with no logos, laces, or trims of a different colour. No sports trainers. No foam soles. No visible "air bubbles". Leather or canvas.

APPEARANCE EXPECTATIONS

HAIRSTYLE - Students whose hairstyle is reasonably deemed offensive, of a non-natural colour, or in any other way disruptive to learning, will be asked to modify that hairstyle, and could be asked to remain in Inclusion until such time as the hair has grown back sufficiently, or the style has grown out.

MAKEUP - Tidy, natural look, minimal make up.

NAILS - Nails should be of a natural look, colour and length. We will ask for nail varnish or false nails to be removed.

JEWELLERY - A watch and, if desired one band (charity) that can be removed for PE. All other jewellery must be removed when in school uniform. All jewellery must be removed for PE. Incidents of theft are rare at SJCS but we do ask, to aid us in minimising this, that students do not bring items of value to school.

PIERCINGS - One earring per ear, which should be a stud for safety reasons, and be in the lower lobe. All piercings must be removed for PE. No facial or body piercings at all.

PE KIT EXPECTATIONS

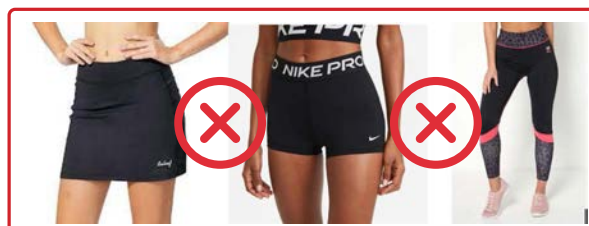
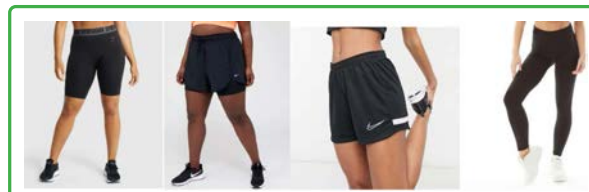
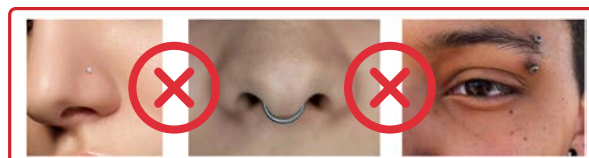
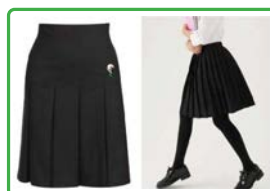
TOP - School polo shirt - house colour.

SHORTS - Black sports shorts, plain with no distinctive branding (shorts must be loose fitting, mid-thigh, not tight fitting Lycra).

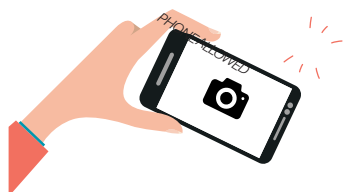
SKORT - This is an optional item and must be the SJCS branded item to ensure it is appropriate.
